

Ohio Food Program and Agricultural Clearance Program

The Ohio Food Program and Agricultural Clearance Program (OFPACP) is generously funded by the State of Ohio and administered by the Ohio Association of Foodbanks in partnership with the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services. It provided 55.5 million pounds, or 46.3 million meals, of wholesome, nutritious foods to hungry

Ohio families in 2018, at a cost per pound of just \$0.329.

OFPACP makes up more than 25 percent of all of the food distributed by Ohio's 12 Feeding America foodbanks.

Governor's Summer Meals Programs

In 2012, Governor John R. Kasich and his Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives committed funding through an Executive Order to support a Weekend Meals Program for low-income children during the summer months. The following year, Governor Kasich added funding to launch a Rural Delivery Meals Program for underserved children, as well as funding for Mobile Farmers Markets targeted at low-income families with children.

Since then, we have partnered each year with the Governor's Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives and the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services to operate a suite of innovative, state-funded summer meals programs for at-risk children in high-need communities. We're so proud of the impact these programs have made on the health and wellbeing of thousands of Ohio kids.



Weekend Meals Program

Through this program, we provide kid-friendly, shelf-stable meals for children attending Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) sites to take home to eat over the weekend. Each bag of weekend meals contains two breakfasts, two lunches, and two dinners, with items like cereal, ravioli, dried fruit, milk, tomato soup, yogurt, and chicken salad. In summer 2018, we partnered with 30 SFSP sponsors to distribute take-home weekend meals to about 10,000 children each week, for 600,000 meals total.

Rural Delivery Meals Program

Many children, especially in rural, remote areas of the state, don't have access to traditional SFSP sites. Some don't have transportation to get to a site, and for others, there simply aren't summer food program sites available. This program provides a week's worth of kid-friendly, shelf-stable meals to children in counties identified as high-need. Each child receives lunches for each day of the week, in addition to two breakfasts, lunches, and dinners for over the weekend. Items include applesauce, macaroni and cheese, juice, vegetable soup, pretzels, tuna salad, fruit snacks, and beef sticks.

In summer 2018, we partnered with 9 nonprofit organizations to deliver or distribute weekly boxes of take-home meals to about 4,400 children each week, for 484,000 meals total.

Mobile Farmers Market Program

In an effort to also connect low-income families with children with fresh fruits and vegetables and staple protein items, we distribute an array of those items at participating Weekend Meals Program and Rural Delivery Meals Program sites. These products help families to stretch limited food purchasing dollars when school is out and children are at home throughout the day during the summer months.

Popular items in summer 2018 included pineapple, watermelon, peaches, bananas, cantaloupe, honeydew, carrots, cauliflower, cucumbers, cabbage, sweet corn, tomatoes, yellow squash, peppers, and peanut butter.

In total, we distributed more than 1.1 million pounds of fruits, vegetables, and proteins at just 39 cents per pound, or less than 8 cents per serving.

The Ohio Benefit Bank™

The Ohio Association of Foodbanks has been proud to implement The Ohio Benefit Bank (OBB™) since 2006. The OBB was designed to ensure that low- and moderate-income Ohioans could access the existing work support programs and tax credits intended to help their households gain stability and meet their basic needs. Through a combination of user-friendly technology and community-based outreach and assistance, the OBB has contributed to incredible strides in Ohio's social service sector, and in the lives of hundreds of thousands of people.



The OBB has evolved over the past 12 years to respond to changing needs and new challenges. We launched a self-serve platform in 2010 to allow Ohioans to complete their own benefit applications and file their own tax returns. We migrated our counselor training to online and on-demand in 2016. We partnered with Communally, developers of The Benefit Bank®, to add case management tools for counselors providing next level services. Our member foodbanks have outstationed in prison facilities to prepare inmates for reentry as part of our statewide USDA SNAP Outreach Plan. We have always been committed to providing responsive and innovative services.

Our longtime supporter, the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS), completed a four-year-long conversion to a new state-based-only online application platform in summer 2018 and have discontinued support for The Benefit Bank platform. However, we continue to partner with ODJFS on the state's USDA SNAP Outreach Plan, and we hope to secure funding to continue providing access to The Benefit Bank for the 1,100 organizations and 3,300 counselors who use it to provide services in their communities. While the future of the OBB is uncertain, our commitment to serving Ohioans in need will not waver.

Since 2006, The Ohio Benefit Bank has helped to connect more than one million people with nearly \$2 billion in potential work support programs, benefits, and tax credits.





Work Experience

We partner with 55 community-based organizations that serve as host sites for Work Experience Program participants. Participants who continue to report to their host sites maintain their SNAP benefits while gaining valuable job skills.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

We're focused on connecting our participants wth tools and skills that will help them secure long-term, stable employment. In SFY 2018, we enrolled WEP participants in vocational education programs including statetested nurse aide (STNA) certification, commercial driver's licensure (CDL), peace officer training, and more.

Work Readiness

In state fiscal year (SFY) 2018, we completed work readiness assessments with 1,743 Franklin County adults, identifying barriers to employment and placing participants into work experience slots at community-based locations. Since late 2013, we have completed nearly 12,000 assessments.

National Service

Since 2006, we have partnered with the Corporation for National and Community Service to deploy AmeriCorps VISTA members and AmeriCorps VISTA Summer Associates throughout Ohio. These national service members work full-time to build the capacity of hunger and poverty fighting organizations and leave a lasting positive impact on their communities. Their projects and positions vary widely, but all contribute to a shared mission to develop and expand innovative programs and solutions that address hunger and poverty. We are proud to support local nonprofits with AmeriCorps VISTA resources and to provide real-world experience for the next generation of nonprofit leaders.



When our members are sworn into service, they take the same oath as the one taken by those entering military service. They each assume the responsibility of carrying out a specific Volunteer Assignment Description, which serves as a detailed guide of their goals and objectives. VISTAs receive modest living stipends set at the poverty level and are eligible for an Education Award to help pay for higher education expenses upon completion of their service.



Our AmeriCorps VISTA Summer Associates work on projects focused on fighting childhood hunger. Most of them serve at Summer Food Service Programs, where they prepare meals, provide nutrition education, recruit volunteers, plan activities, and more. Others support projects like community gardens and produce distributions. In summer 2018, 67 AmeriCorps VISTA Summer Associates helped their host sites to provide about 420,000 meals.



Our AmeriCorps VISTA members participate in four National Days of Service during their terms. This year, our members came together for a 9/11 service project, cleaning and restoring 245 headstones for U.S. veterans laid to rest at Green Lawn Cemetery in Columbus (pictured above). Some of our southeast Ohio members collaborated with CNCS to host a National Service Recognition Day event in Athens featuring local mayors and elected officials.



Our host sites tell us they find AmeriCorps VISTA members invaluable. As one host site put it this year, "[The VISTAs] showed up on time, worked hard, and truly energized everyone around them. I would have given any of them permanent positions in our organization. Sometimes you just get extra hands, but sometimes you get young people who remind us why we do what we do, and end up making all of us better at it. They were all absolute rock stars."

Since 2006, the Ohio Association of Foodbanks has deployed more than 1,200 AmeriCorps VISTA members to fight poverty in local communities.



Resource Development

Our AmeriCorps VISTA members raised more than \$893,653, including \$766,124 in cash and \$127,529 in-kind, last year. Since 2006, our members have raised more than \$4.15 million in cash and in-kind donations to build the capacity of their host sites and communities.



Food Security

In state fiscal year 2018, our AmeriCorps VISTA members established 121 new systems and processes for serving food insecure clients. Those systems helped to provide 16,330 clients with referrals for help with food or nutrition education. Additionally, VISTA members completed 485 outreach events and presentations to advance and promote their work.



Just last year, our AmeriCorps VISTA members recruited 1,162 volunteers who served 4,560 volunteer hours in their communities. Since inception, our members have recruited 38,985 volunteers who have dedicated 339,454 hours of volunteer service to local nonprofits.

Public Policy Advocacy in 2018

Throughout the past year, we have fought to advocate for food insecure Ohioans during seemingly constant public policy debates at the state and federal levels. As Ohio's leading anti-hunger advocate, we know that the emergency hunger relief network we represent can't begin to meet the demand for help with food on its own. In fact, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly known as food stamps) is our nation's first and most critical line of defense against hunger.



Unfortunately, SNAP has been repeatedly attacked through a variety of misinformed proposals that fail to acknowledge the significant value of SNAP to not only food insecure families, but our local and state economies in whole. From presidential budget proposals to Farm Bill hearings, this longstanding and proven nutrition program has been threatened over and over again.

Along with our member foodbanks, we spoke with Ohio's congressional delegation during in-district site visits and meetings on Capitol Hill, sharing the message that our network can't fight hunger on our own, and that SNAP should be protected and strengthened.

We will continue to advocate on behalf of the more than 2 million people we serve and to fight for programs and policies that address food insecurity and its roots causes. Thank you to all of the organizations and individuals that joined us this year in raising their voices.


