

# NETWORK SNAPSHOT

Our statewide network of 12 Feeding America foodbanks and 3,644 member hunger relief agencies and programs provided 281,915,071 pounds of take-home groceries, or enough to provide 235 million meals, from July 1, 2024, to June 30, 2025.

Collectively, our network fulfilled 5,921,836 visits by households to food pantries. On average, we provided take-home groceries to 1.4 million household members each month, or 16,807,804 service visits total during the year, including 5,030,230 children (30%), 8,355,584 adults (49.7%), and 3,421,990 seniors (20.3%). Our network also provided 17,731,079 prepared meals through shelters, hot meal sites, and other supplemental feeding sites.



# SOURCES OF FOOD, AS DISTRIBUTED



## State Funding Sources:

- Ohio Agricultural Clearance Program: Operated by the Ohio Association of Foodbanks with funding from the State of Ohio to procure surplus and unmarketable fruits, vegetables, and dairy items.
- Ohio Food Program: Operated by the Ohio Association of Foodbanks with funding from the State of Ohio to purchase shelf-stable and protein items.

## Private Funding Sources:

- Purchased Food: Purchased foods are products that foodbanks buy using monetary donations and charitable dollars.
- Donated Food: Donated foods include products donated through retailer and manufacturer donations and corporate and community-based food drives.

## Federal Funding Sources:

- Commodity Supplemental Food Program: CSFP is administered by the USDA with funding appropriated by Congress to provide monthly food boxes to low-income older adults.
- The Emergency Food Assistance Program: TEFAP is administered by the USDA with funding appropriated by Congress to provide food to people facing hunger.
- Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative: LFPA or Ohio CAN is a program administered by the USDA and implemented in partnership with the State of Ohio to support a resilient local and regional food supply chain.

The Ohio Agricultural Clearance Program (ACP), made possible through the support of the State of Ohio and our partnership with the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services, connects families facing hunger with surplus and otherwise unmarketable fruits and vegetables. By partnering with farmers and growers across the state and region, the program strengthens our local food system while ensuring nutritious, freshly grown foods reach Ohioans through our foodbank network.

In State Fiscal Year 2025, the Ohio Agricultural Clearance Program provided millions of pounds of fresh, healthful foods, equivalent to 30.6 million meals for families in need across the state.

## Ohio CAN

In FY2025, the Ohio Association of Foodbanks continued to strengthen Ohio's food system through the USDA Local Food Purchase Assistance Program (LFPA), known in our state as Ohio CAN (Community + Agriculture + Nutrition). We are proud to have operated Ohio CAN, which expanded food access for families while supporting a more resilient and sustainable agricultural economy. Over the course of the program, USDA and the State of Ohio invested \$26.5 million—\$13.5 million in 2022 for round one and an additional \$13 million for round two, or LFPA Plus, spanning roughly three years of impact. Ohio's program concluded in June 2025 when federal funding for the program ended and was not reauthorized.

Through funding from USDA and in partnership with the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services, Ohio Department of Agriculture, Ohio Department of Education, and a diverse network of local and regional producers, the program expanded access to culturally responsive foods and created reliable markets for small and mid-size, beginning, and underrepresented farmers and suppliers. We are proud of the work accomplished by our farmers, growers, producers, and foodbank network over the past three years, and we are grateful for the partnerships that made it possible to share wholesome, local food with our neighbors.

## AmeriCorps VISTA

Through our AmeriCorps VISTA program, we connect passionate individuals with full-time, year-long service opportunities at foodbanks, food pantries, health clinics, afterschool programs, community action agencies, higher education institutions, and other nonprofit organizations across Ohio. By focusing on indirect service, VISTA members build organizational capacity, strengthen community resilience, and create lasting solutions to hunger and poverty—all while gaining valuable professional skills and experience. “Our VISTA member was instrumental in supporting our produce giveaway program. Most of the produce grown at Mid-Ohio Farms is distributed through the larger Mid-Ohio Food Collective network at Mid-Ohio Markets. However, both Mid-Ohio Farm at NBC4 and Mid-Ohio Farm on the Hilltop are surrounded by residential areas. There was a disconnect at both farms between Mid-Ohio Farm and our immediate neighbors. Enter Produce Giveaways. Piloted in summer of 2024 at Mid-Ohio Farm at NBC4, this program involved a pop-up market stand right next to the farm where neighbors living in surrounding apartments could walk to. Produce grown and harvested on the farm was distributed at the pop-up market stand and included items like lettuce, tomatoes, garlic, peppers, kale, onions, and fresh herbs. Our VISTA supported this program from ideation all the way through execution, working on everything from date/time selection, to marketing, to day-of logistics. The program was so well-received that we are not only continuing it at Mid-Ohio Farm at NBC4, we also plan on expanding it to Mid-Ohio Farm on the Hilltop this summer.”

# HEALTH COVERAGE PROGRAMS

## Get Covered Ohio

Get Covered Ohio helps connect Ohioans with free, unbiased assistance to explore health insurance options, enroll in coverage, and understand and use their benefits. This statewide initiative partners with eight local and regional organizations that provide Navigator services, working together to empower individuals and families to access affordable health care. Through focused outreach and personalized support, Get Covered Ohio works to break down barriers to coverage and advance health equity across the state.





Ohioans depend not only on adequate, nutritious food for a healthy life, but also reliable access to affordable health coverage and care. We are proud to operate two health insurance outreach and enrollment programs through Cooperative Agreements with the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), in partnership with a consortium of local, regional, and statewide organizations.

## Connecting Kids to Coverage

Connecting Kids to Coverage is a national initiative that informs families about health coverage eligibility, benefits, and the application process for children, parents, and pregnant individuals. Focused on advancing health equity in Franklin County, the program aims to raise awareness, create enrollment opportunities, and motivate families to secure coverage. In 2025, the CKC team partnered with community organizations, launched impactful marketing efforts, and helped more families gain access to the health care they need.

“Earlier this year, a Navigator worked with a family who reached out feeling completely overwhelmed. The husband was preparing to retire and would soon lose the employer-sponsored health coverage that had supported the whole family. On top of that, his wife had recently stopped working due to an injury, which left them unsure about their options moving forward. With chronic health conditions in the picture, continuing their health coverage was critical—but they didn’t know where to start. When they reached out, they were looking for guidance—and were grateful to find a local Navigator. Together, they reviewed their situation and walked through the different coverage options available. I answered their questions, clarified their eligibility, and helped them complete the application. In the end, they were able to enroll the entire family in a new health insurance plan through the Marketplace without any lapses in coverage.”

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
# BENEFIT OUTREACH PROGRAMS

## Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

For many Ohioans, applying for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) isn't easy. Limited internet or phone access, transportation hurdles, and confusion about how public benefits work can all stand in the way. Yet SNAP is critical for family stability and well-being, helping households keep food on the table while balancing other essential needs. That's why we work alongside the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service, the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services, and our foodbank network to carry out Ohio's SNAP Outreach Plan, breaking down barriers so more people can connect with the food support they need.

Through those efforts, we estimate that **52,963** eligible individuals were connected to **\$127 million** in SNAP benefits, significantly enhancing food purchasing power for families in need.

In 2025, our network continued its corrections in-reach at all 28 state correctional facilities and select private institutions, helping incarcerated individuals prepare for reentry with essential benefits. Through this program, we ensure that newly returning citizens can access food assistance and begin rebuilding stability as they transition back into their communities.

We were proud to continue our partnership with the Ohio Development Services Agency to raise awareness about the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), helping households manage energy costs and maintain stability. Through this work, we assisted families in completing applications, connecting them with support for food, housing, and utilities.

### SNAP-Ed

In SFY 2025, we partnered with The Ohio State University Extension on Ohio’s SNAP-Ed Program, administered by ODJFS and USDA FNS. Together, we strengthened nutrition education in Ohio’s hunger relief network by connecting families to healthy, budget-friendly recipes, programs, and resources. With support from researchers, dietitians, and nutrition experts, SNAP-Ed provided simple, cost-effective ways to improve health through food. Through initiatives like the Mobile Education Nutrition Unit (MENU), cooking demonstrations, and recipe cards, families can make the most of food from distributions or SNAP benefits. We’re grateful to Ohio SNAP-Ed for helping equip Ohioans with the tools to prepare healthy meals.



Nicole and her husband support their family of seven on a single \$23/hour income. She stays home with their young children to avoid childcare costs and relies on SNAP to keep them fed, ensuring her children have meals even as rising costs make ends meet difficult.


## Hunger and Health

The Ohio Association of Foodbanks is actively building partnerships with healthcare providers and insurers to enhance health outcomes across our network. Our Foodbank Champions Team, a dedicated group of staff from foodbanks committed to improving the health of Ohioans, meets regularly to identify opportunities for collaboration, resource sharing, and effective program implementation and policy change. These efforts position our network as a key partner in integrating community-based nutrition interventions into Ohio’s healthcare system. We are engaged in statewide initiatives to align Food is Medicine programming with healthcare priorities and ensure our network has a voice in important decision-making spaces. Through this collective work, the Foodbank Champions Team is strengthening the role of foodbanks in reducing food insecurity, advancing nutrition security, and improving the overall health of Ohioans.



After a heart attack and subsequent diagnoses of liver failure and type 2 diabetes, Steven had to leave his construction sales job, facing high medical costs and financial strain. Though familiar with volunteering at food pantries, he had never needed them until one day he began visiting the pantry at Cleveland Clinic Akron General, a partnership with the foodbank. With guidance from on-site dietitians, Steven receives low-sodium and low-carb foods that meet his health needs while helping him save money for rent, utilities, and medications.

**“Because of the pantry, I can pay for my meds,”** says Steven, appreciative of everyone who supports local hunger relief.

## Advocacy and Public Policy

The Ohio Association of Foodbanks is proud to serve as Ohio's leading anti-hunger policy expert. We provide expertise on public policy that affects people facing hunger and work closely with state, regional, and federal policymakers to improve programs that reduce hunger and promote household security. Over the past year, we partnered with the State of Ohio and the DeWine-Tressel Administration to streamline access to nutrition assistance and health care coverage programs for workers and families.

Our external affairs team engaged extensively with policymakers through meetings, site visits, presentations, and other interactions, engaging on key legislation and providing subject-matter expertise. We also mobilized grassroots supporters to take action on priority issues, helping ensure that the voices of people impacted by food insecurity are heard in policy discussions.

To strengthen the impact of our network, we expanded our capacity to coordinate closely with foodbanks' government relations staff. Through monthly meetings, quarterly events, regular email updates, and provision of trainings, toolkits, and templates, we equip local foodbanks to engage effectively with policymakers. While we remain committed to addressing immediate needs, we also remain focused on long-term, policy-driven solutions that tackle the root causes of hunger.
